Hal Johnson - 1956 - Present

Hall Johnston is a television host and athlete best known for the late 80s and early 90s television show called Body Break. Hal was the first Black Canadian to have a health television show that aimed to encourage Canadians to lead healthy lives.



Hodan Nalayeh - 1976 - 2019

Hodan was a Somali Canadian, journalist and businesswoman who fought to change the narrative of the Somali community that is often portrayed in the media. She created Integration TV, the first English-language online platform for Somalis around the world. Hodan began sharing positive stories about a community that is so often maligned and quickly became a household name. Watch her documentary here.



<u> John Ware</u> - 1845 – 1905

John is legendary in the history of Canada for his strength, farming techniques and horsemanship. Born enslaved, he became a successful rancher who settled his first ranch near Calgary, Alberta. Despite widespread anti-Black racism and discrimination, he was widely admired as one of the best ranchers and cowboys in the West.



Mary Ann Shadd - 1823 - 1893

Mary Ann was an educator, publisher, lawyer, and abolitionist. Mary Ann became the first Black woman in North America to publish and edit a newspaper, The Provincial Freeman. She promoted the abolition of slavery and the emigration of African Americans to Canada. She also advocated on behalf of women's rights.



Michaëlle Jean - 1957 - Present

Michaelle is a social activist, journalist, documentary filmmaker, governor general of Canada from 2005 to 2010. She was the first Black person to serve as Governor General and is the first woman and Canadian to be appointed Secretary General of the International Organization of La Francophonie.

The Ontario Black History Society is created and began to make **Black History Month** official in Canada.

The first Black **History Month** in Nova Scotia takes place.

The Ontario Black **History Society** successfully petitions to officially declare February as Black History Month.

The House of Commons officially recognizes February Month takes as Black History Month in Canada. The decision was unanimous.

The first official **Black History** place in Canada. Senator Donald Oliver introduces the Motion to Recognize Contributions of Black Canadians and February as Black History Month.
